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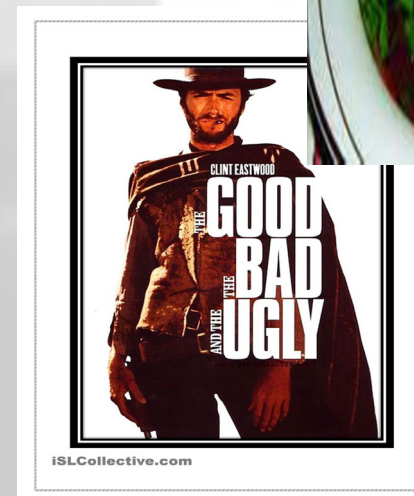

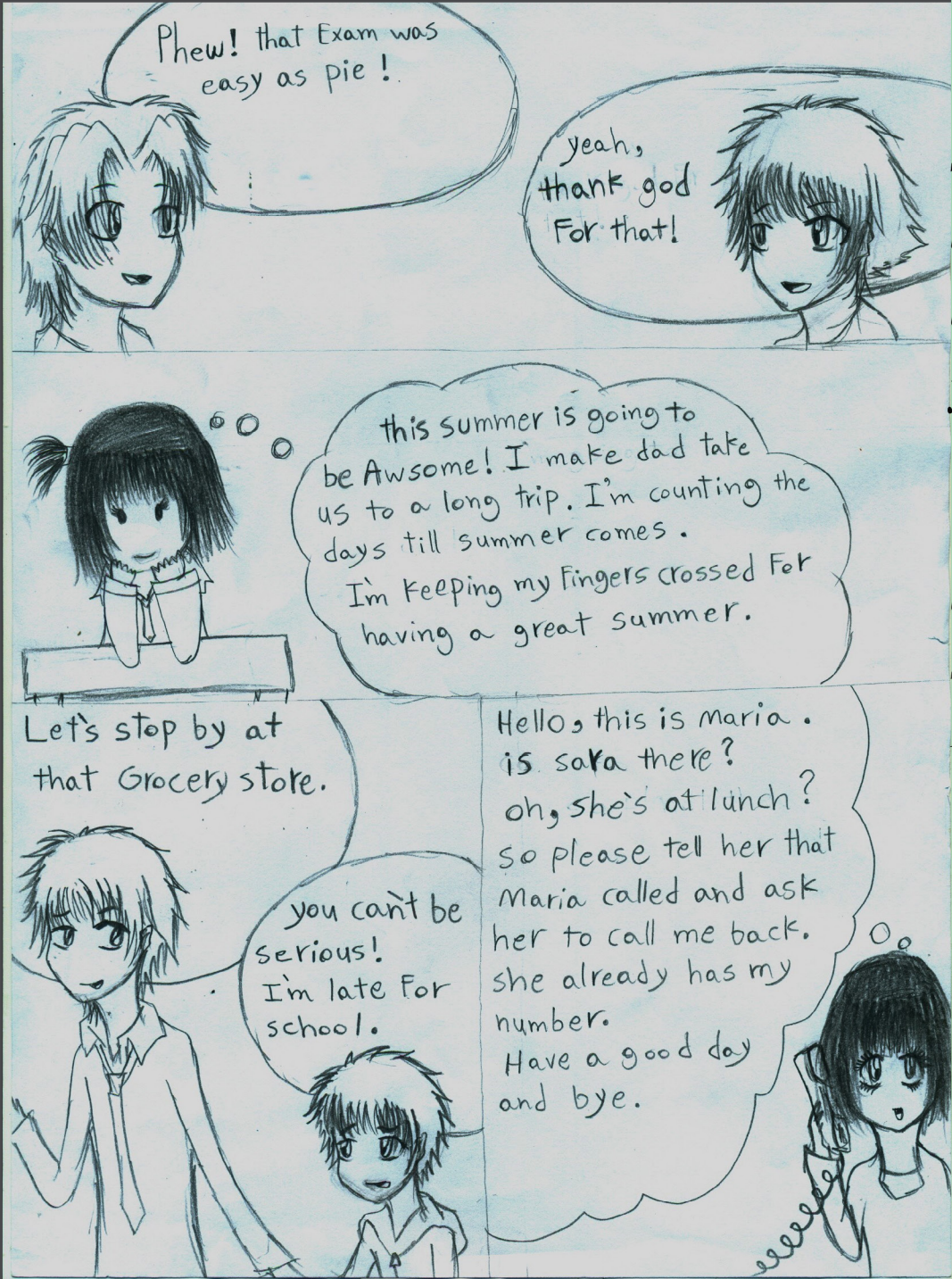
## A Note from the Editor

**Prepositions 1**

Hi dear English lovers

As the third issue of English Break, now I'm here to share really important and maybe

confusing grammar points with you ....

And those points are about prepositions, no matter what your level is, and how fluent you are, there are some occasions you doubt what preposition



you should use.

First take a look at this picture as a hors d'oeuvre\*:

Part1: at/in and to

1. At and in are generally

for positions, to is used for movement and direction. -he works at the market. He gets to the market by bike.

2. If we mention the purpose of a movement before destination, we usually use at/in before the place.

-let's go to Marcel's for coffee let's go and have coffee at Marcel's

3. After some verbs, at is used with a perception or a non-verbal communication.

Common examples are look, smile, wave, and frown.

-why are you looking at her like that?

-because she smiled at me.

4. At is also used after some verbs referring to attacks or aggressive behavior.

Common examples are shoot, throw, shout and point.

-its strange feeling to have somebody shoot at you.

5. Throw to, shout to and

point to are used when there is no idea of attack. -please do not throw food to animals.

6. Arrive is generally followed by at or in; never by to. -we should arrive at Pat's in time for lunch.

## Love of English(Advanced)

Past Continuous and its uses;

### Form

Was/were + present participle

You were reading when I walked in.

Were you studying when I called you?

You were not working when I called you.

The Past Continuous has 4 main uses/functions:

### Use 1 – an interrupted action in the past

Here the Past Continuous is used to indicate a long action that was interrupted. Usually the action that interrupts the long action is the Past Simple.

I was studying when Danny called me.

She was answering an important e-mail when I interrupted her.

While I was jogging, it started raining.

What was he doing when you walked into the room?

John was waiting for us when we got off the train.

I broke my leg while I was skiing.

### Use 2 – parallel actions

The Past Continuous is used to indicate that two actions were happening at the same time; hence parallel actions.

I was watching TV while the children were playing outside.

Were you listening while Kevin was explaining the new policy?

While Sarah was speaking to Fred, Peter was trying to get her attention.

What were they doing while you were working?

We were discussing the new project and having a good time as well.

### Use 3 – describing a mood/ atmosphere

We can use the Past Continuous to describe several actions happening at the same time to describe the atmosphere or situation before or as a main action occurs.

When I walked into the bar, Danny and Fred were arguing again. Chris was chatting to the barman with his usual pint. Peter and Sarah were flirting with each other and Liz was telling the rest of the gang one of her outrageous stories about when she was an actress in the West End.

The pub was already smelling of pub food and beer and I just felt that it was so good to be home.

### Use 4 – repetition – irritation with ‘always’

The Past Continuous with words such as ‘always’ or ‘constantly’ indicates something repeated or irritating. Words like ‘always’ should be placed between the auxiliary ‘be’ and the present participle.

She was always coming late for meetings. No wonder she was never promoted.

He was always boasting about his financial successes. It irritated us all no end.

I was constantly misplacing my glasses. It’s not a problem with contacts now.

### While or when

With the Past Continuous sentences have clauses that start with ‘while’ or ‘when’. ‘While’ usually starts the clause with the Past Continuous, ‘when’ usually starts the clause with the Past Simple.

It started raining while I was jogging. / While I was jogging, it started raining.

When it started raining, I was jogging. / I was jogging when it started raining

Notice that although the meaning of each pair of sentences is the same, ‘while’ or ‘when’ shift emphasis.

## Healthy Wealthy Recipes

### Tabriz meatballs recipe (Koofte Tabrizi)

#### Ingredients:

1. Machined ground beef (veal or lamb) : 1kg
2. 1 Cup split peas [soaked, half cooked, drained, and mashed]
3. 1 Cup short-grain rice [half-cooked]
4. 2 Medium onions
5. 4 soup-spoon [SS] chives
6. 2 SS serviceberry
7. 1 SS mint
8. 1 SS tarragon
9. 1 SS basil
10. 1 SS parsley
11. 1 SS dill
12. 1 raw egg
13. Salt, black pepper, caraway, turmeric, ginger, cinnamon

#### Filling:

1. 2 hardboiled eggs [shelled]
2. 6 Soft dried prunes
3. Sweetened barberry [zereshk]
4. Walnut

#### Bouillon:

1. 3 tablespoons vegetable oil
2. 1 medium onion, sliced
3. 1/4 teaspoon turmeric ground
4. 1 cup tomatoes
5. 1/5 table spoon tomato paste
6. 1 teaspoon salt
7. 8 cups of water

#### Prep work:

Cook split peas until tender.

Cook rice until just tender.

Grate one of the two onions and small dice the other onion. Place cooked split peas in a food processor to mash. The idea is for the split peas to have



a dough consistency. Place only 1/4 of machined ground beef in food processor to knead for the same reason, too; [consider if you knead the whole amount in food processor, it would turn to a hard, not eatable texture].

#### Direction:

Combine ground beef, rice, split peas, grated onion, one raw egg, all chopped herbs and spices.

Mix well together.

Knead the mixture until it turns into a dough consistency. Make sure that you have seasoned the mixture well with salt.



Saute the diced onion in some oil

until golden for stuffing the meatball. Also quickly saute the barberry in some oil or butter for a few minutes. Toast walnuts for a few minutes. Then gather all the ingredients along with a bowl lined with a cheese cloth. To make it easier on yourself place a rubber band around the edges of the bowl so that it holds the cheese cloth.

Moisten your hands with cold water not to stick to mixture. This sum of ingredient gives you 2 meatballs.

Gently add the majority of the mixture to the bowl leaving behind about one handful of it.

Create a well by pushing the dough towards the wall of the bowl. Place the hardboiled egg in the middle.

Add prunes around the egg. You can use any prunes you like. Also, the pits stay in. Just warn those who you are serving this meal with about the pits!!!

Add barberry

Add onion.

Add walnuts.



Place remaining dough mixture on top and gently press down to seal.

Go around the edges and seal the meatball.

Carefully close shut each corner of the cheese cloth.

I would offer making a bow so that way it's easier to open later.

Gently pick up the huge meatball and shape it into a ball.

Gently go around and shape it with your hands into a ball.

Gently pick up the gigantic meatball and shape it into a ball.



#### Bouillon:

To make the broth, heat the oil in a pan, add the onions, and stir-fry over moderate heat until light brown, about 3 minutes. Add the turmeric, tomato paste, tomatoes and salt and stir-fry for 2 minutes more. Add the water and bring to a boil, and place the meatballs into the boiling water.

As it cooks pour some of the liquid over it within the first 20 minutes. Half way through the cooking process gently and carefully flip the meatball.

When they have risen to the surface, cook for another 45 minutes over a moderate heat.

The meatballs and bouillon are served separately. The bouillon is eaten as a soup and the meatballs as a main dish.

Once ready take the meatball out and place it in a deep serving bowl. Remove cheese cloth and ladle the sauce over the meatball. .

This is such a delicious meal and it's perfect on a cold day. The delicious smell of the Koofte takes over the house as it cooks and flirts with your nose!!!

It's definitely a good thing that for the first experience, you and your mom can make this recipe together to offer her hand when you are handling raw meat. Weeee that

would be an adventure if you be on your own in the next experience.

#### Glossary:

Veal: the meat of a young cow

Lamb: the meat of a young sheep

Prune: the dried, wrinkled fruit of certain species for plum.

Tender: soft and easily chewed; delicate.

Saute: to cook food using a small amount of fat in an open pan over a relatively high heat, allowing the food to brown and form a crust stopping it from sticking to the pan as it cooks.

Pit: [in fruit] the single large hard seed in some fruits; stone

Bouillon: broth

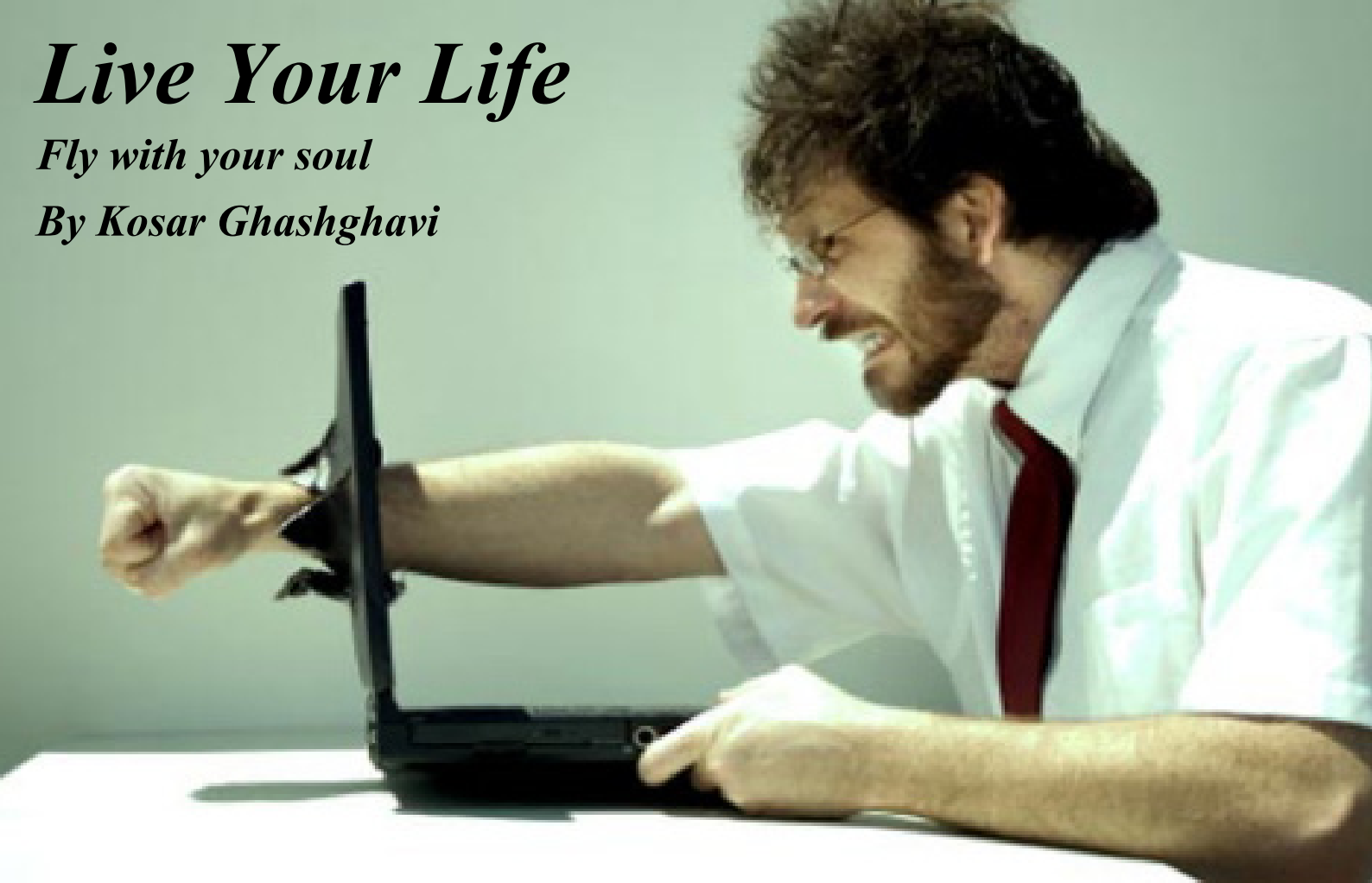




# Live Your Life

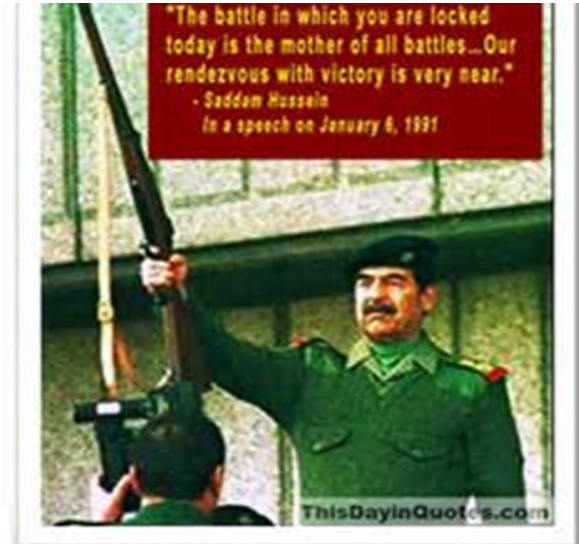

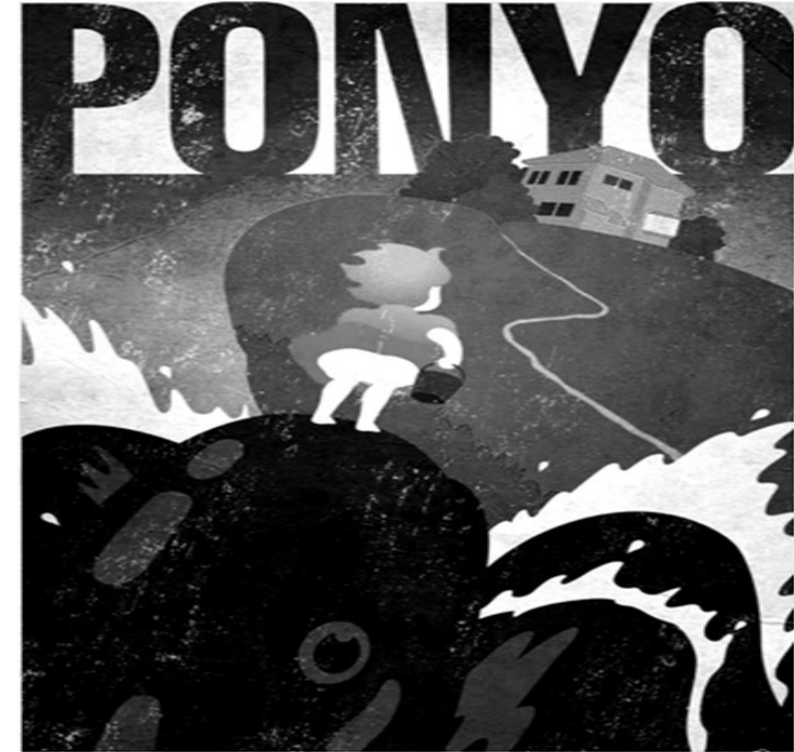


Whether you are a 5 year old girl or an adult Ponyo is good to watch, especially if you are a mother you both can watch it together.

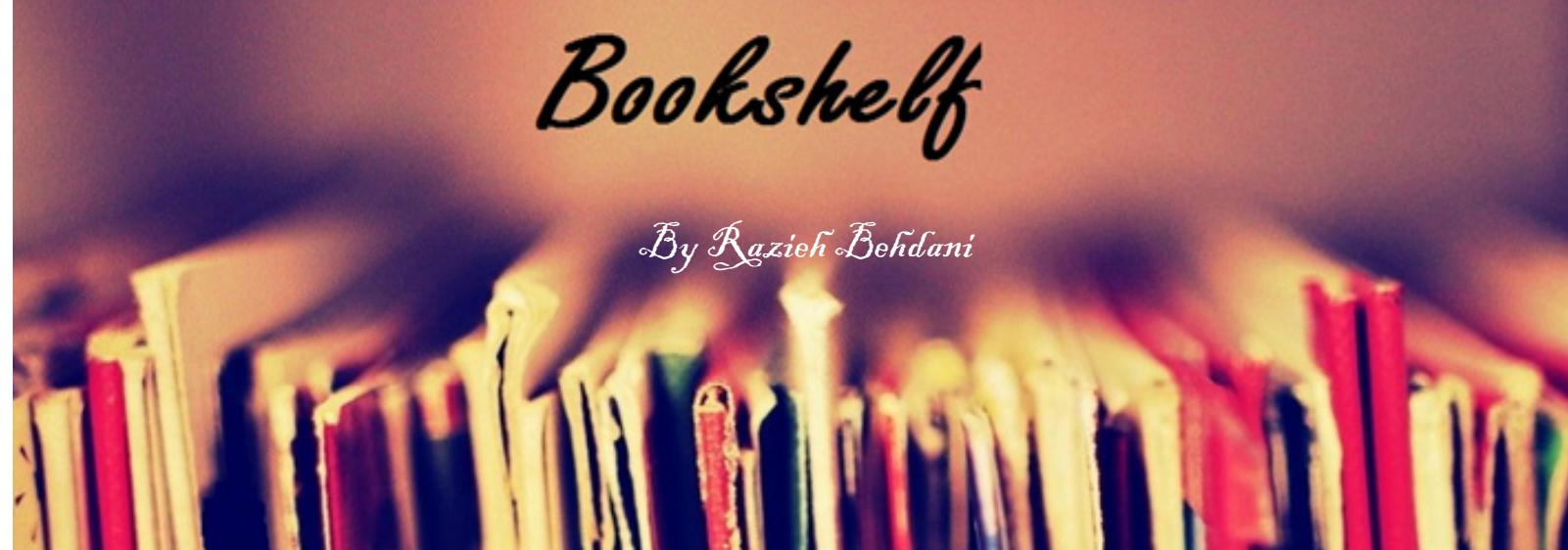

**H**e was born on July 21, 1951 in Chicago, Illinois, a great-great-grandson of Mississippi Governor and Senator Anselm J. McLaurin. His mother, Laurie McLaurin (née Janin), was a former model from Mississippi, and his father, Robert Fitzgerald Williams, was a Ford Motor Company executive from Indiana. He had English, German, French, Welsh, Irish, and Scottish ancestry.

He briefly studied political science, before enrolling at Juilliard School to study theatre. After he left Juilliard, he performed in nightclubs where he was discovered for the role of Mork on an episode of *Happy Days* (1974) and the subsequent spin-off *Mork & Mindy* (1978). His wild comic talent involved a great deal of improvisation, following in the footsteps of his idol Jonathan Winters. He has also proven to be an effective dramatic actor and received an Academy Award for Best Actor in a Supporting Role in *Good Will Hunting* (1997).

On August 11, 2014, He was found dead at his home in Tiburon, California USA, the victim of an apparent suicide,

according to the Marin County Sheriff’s Department. A 911 call was received at 11:55 AM PDT, firefighters and paramedics arrived at his home at 12:00 PM PDT, and he was pronounced dead at 12:02 PM PDT.

2- After having won the Academy Award for *Good Will Hunting* (1997), he sent Peer Augustinski (who was his standard German dubbing voice) a little Oscar replica with a note: “Thank you for making me famous in Germany.”

3- Early in his career, he told a reporter that he was born in Scotland. His original press releases indeed listed Scotland as his place of birth. He admitted that he was “under the influence” at the time he said this. He was really born in Chicago.

4- He was a very overweight child. As a result, nobody would play with him. He started talking in different voices to entertain himself.

5- He was frequently called up by Steven Spielberg when he was filming *Schindler’s List* (1993). He would put him on speaker phone so he could tell jokes to the cast and crew to cheer them up. He used his character in *Aladdin* (1992) most of the time.
