### Friedrich Mietzsche's Wiews of Women

Introduction: Writing about Nietzsche's views on women is beyond the capacity of a four-page essay, but we will do our best in order not to miss any important points. Whenever one speaks about Nietzsche among a group of people, undoubtedly a majority will call him a misogynist philosopher and others have various opinions towards him. Overall, commenting about such a great philosopher is not a piece of cake. Nietzsche's theories on women is ambivalent, in a way that on one hand we can call him a feminist who tries to defend women, according to some of his quotes, and on the other hand we can call him a misogynist according to his other quotes. Due to this fact, it has been said that most of his books and quotes are equivocal and paradoxical. Subsequently, we cannot defiantly call Nietzsche a feminist or a misogynist, thereupon we will assess both sides in order to cover all aspects of his views.

If we take a brief look at Nietzsche's life, we can understand that he has grown up in a totally feminine environment. His father had passed away when he was only five, so 5 year old Nietzsche had to continue with his mother, sister, grandmother and unmarried paternal aunts. He was completely surrounded with women and was unconsciously under their influence. It has also been mentioned that he had some feminine features, hence we can say on one hand he was fed up with this situation, on the other hand he was completely familiar with women and their features even those that cannot be easily recognized by men, so this issue could be counted as a threat to women, since every hidden aspect of their individuality had been reveled to a

Nietzsche was abandoned by his Russian beloved Lou Andreas-Salome. It has been expressed that Lou Salome saw herself defenseless in his presence, and she thought as if Nietzsche could see her soul or read her mind. She had also confessed that she was afraid of Nietzsche staring at her. This sorrowful loss influenced Nietzsche even more and led him toward misogyny, but it does not mean that he was an enemy of women. Different philosophers have different approaches towards Nietzsche's supposed misogyny; some of them such as Walter Kaufmann ignore it and assert that it is not a philosophical theory and try to show that Nietzsche's views on women were unimportant and irrelevant to the rest of his philosophy. "Nietzsche's writings contain many all-too-human judgments -especially about women - but these are philosophically irrelevant" (Kaufmann, p.84). Kaufmann believes that "Nietzsche's prejudices about women need not greatly concern the philosopher" and furthermore that "ad hominem arguments against any philosopher on the basis of such statements seem trivial and hardly pertinent" (Kaufmann, p. 84)."

(Hudgens, Forget Not the Whip, p 20-21). Kaufmann believes that Nietzsche's views were historically connected to the zeitgeist of his time, as he states that "Nietzsche's epigrams about women may have been connected with his own experiences." (Kaufmann, p.84)

In contrast to Kaufmann, Nietzsche's first and best ardent fan "Carol Diethe" who was a feminist critic defended his views and indicated that "Nietzsche is a virulent misogynist and chauvinist par excellence, it would be wrong to simply dismiss Nietzsche's commentary about women as philosophically irrelevant as Kaufmann does" (Hudgens, Forget Not the Whip, p.23). Therefor she believes that Nietzsche's views are totally relevant to the rest of his philosophies. With this in mind, we have two contradictory approaches. Kaufmann's view causes the emersion of patriarchy

that is,

while women try to consolidate their position through philosophy, male philosophers try to change the result as they wish. It should be taken into consideration that Nietzsche writes in a dualistic manner, so understanding his intentions require a deep study of his published works.

"Go to the women? Forget not the whip" (Thus Spake Zarathustra). This is one of Nietzsche's most famous quotes which is ambivalent. Apparently it shows violence against women, but it can be interpreted in a different way; if we consider whip as "rationality of men", we can see how women are praised by Nietzsche and have indirectly been called wise beings, but the second view is farfetched, because a man like Nietzsche who mostly speaks about women when he wants to represent men's superiority is rarely liable to have the latter intention. Even he believes that women can have no role in their destiny and every single aspect of their lives has been arranged in advance. He does not hold the same idea when it comes to men. He claims that men arrange their destiny themselves.

In his other quotes, he sympathized with women when they were trained and actually forced in order not to speak about their sexual desires and considered that a terrible shame. Therefore, their knowledge and information in this field could not increase too. As a result of this kind of training their desire to become a mother was suppressed, then if they wanted to be a mother it would not be regarded a positive and acceptable demand, whereas it was not the same case with men, and even this way of thinking gave them a sense of masculinity. Maybe this attitude was born of men's knowledge of women's superior sexual power. The power of becoming mothers and giving birth to mankind. With this in mind, they wanted to keep women unaware of this superiority to control them easily. He actually believed that whatever keeps women far from their most important duty which is growing up children, is evil.

What makes women frightening and also connects them to men is their sex. Self-creation, the ability of being connected to the nature and giving birth to someone is emphasized frequently in his theories and maybe this power of women is making him sensitive, and he does not want to accept them as the superior sex or at least equal to men.

He wants to devalue females by declaring that their completion is dependent on men, while the being of each man is dependent on women. He is constantly controverting his own ideas. Now the question is "Can we call Nietzsche a feminist or not?" In order to answer this question, we should go back to the late 19th and early 20th, as during this period the first wave of feminism had risen in Germany. In this movement, feminists demanded the right to vote, own property and obtain higher education for women. There are some ideas which imply that Nietzsche's quotes were powerful hints for feminists in those time, in a way that by reading Nietzsche they had come to the conclusion that women are superior to men or at least both sexes can be equal.

Nietzsche speaks as if he believes women are superior to men and this is a fact but the problem is that men do not want to accept this superiority, since they do believe that women's consciousness of their own abilities would endanger the males.

"The men of our epoch treat the weaker sex with more respect than any epoch has ever done - this is part of the democratic tendency and fundamental taste, as is a lack of respect for age -: is it any wonder that this respect is immediately misused? People want more, people learn to make demands, people ultimately find this respect tax almost hurtful, people would prefer to compete for rights or, in all seriousness, wage war: enough, woman loses her shame. Let us immediately add that she also loses her taste. She forgets her fear of man: but the woman who "forgets fear" abandons her most feminine

instincts.

It is fair enough and also understandable enough for women to dare to emerge when fear of men is no longer inculcated, or, to be more exact, when the man in men is no longer wanted and cultivated; what is more difficult to understand is that in the process – women degenerate...While women are seizing new rights in this manner, trying to become "master" and writing "progress" for women on their flags and pennants, the opposite is taking place with terrifying clarity: women are regressing..." (Beyond Good and Evil, 239).

In this long and beautiful quote indirectly but obviously women have the authoritative backing of Nietzsche. He refers to women's hidden powers. He knows that women are strong. He also asserts that their strengths can weaken men's masculinity and destroy the utopia they have made for themselves based on patriarchy. "So far, men have been treating women like birds that have lost their way and flown down to them from some height or another: like something finer, more vulnerable, wilder, stranger, sweeter, more soulful, -but also like something

that has to be locked up to keep it from flying away" (Beyond Good and Evil, 237)

Once again he has pictured women's fragile soul and vulnerability. From my point of view Nietzsche does not mean that women are weak and should be protected but he simply shows how sensitive these lovely creatures are. They give joy and pleasure to men and don't miss their liberty. To sum up, Nietzsche, as a great philosopher who is highly appreciated all over the world, is mostly known as a misogynist but by looking deeply to some of his works we can figure out that he was aware of women's values and abilities. With this in mind we cannot call him a feminist for sure, as we do not have enough document and reason to prove it, but we tried hard to make bold some of his special works.




Let's think about that in biology terms. Apart from apparent physical differences, there are other differences that separate us from a man as mentioned in the following list:

- 3- Women develop their Prefrontal Cortex (PFC: The decision center of the brain that controls social behavior, judgment, and consequential thinking.) at a younger age, which is why they take fewer risks as teenagers than males of the same age.
- 4- Women have a larger PFC and men have a larger amygdala, which means men have more processing power for threats, and women have more processing power for details.
- 5- Women have a larger anterior cortex \_Where people process emotions, arrange memories, and ruminate: aka, the 'worrywart' center of the brain. Which means they spend more time ruminating, trying to process emotions and, well, worrying.
- 6- Women have higher rates of anxiety than men. Researchers think this might come down to the highly sensitized female anterior cortex.

#### 7- And so on!

There are so many neurological differences that even their names would require a multi-volume book to mention. But, the bottom line is, men and women are different! That's easy and logical to understand, so, why would we treat them the same?

Should their differences (physical and mental) be ignored? Is that fair? I believe in pursuit of equality. we are forgetting that we're ignoring our true selves. We are not dueling on "who's better that who" because the answer is no one! We are


#### EQUALS IN VALUE, BUT DIFFERENT IN FUNCTION.

Have you ever thought why women have lower expectations of their own sex, and what can be done about it? We are shocked to see that "women are assumed to be incompetent unless proven otherwise, and men are assumed to be competent unless proven otherwise by both the males and the females". For example, even females may prefer a man over a woman for a job, while they have identical qualifications. Where does this bias come from? There are some facts in play at the backdrop of this issue that give rise to implicit gender-biases.

Scientifically, the unconscious part of our mind has more processing power than the conscious one. It creates shortcuts known as heuristics, and these heuristics are born of experience. For example, once a child burns his hand with an oven door, they will always associate the oven with burning. The society is also filled with men holding top positions. Thus, people mostly associate manhood with leadership, success and competence, and womanhood with home, children and incompetence. Naturally, people can't associate vice versa. ### Mark Twain and His Feminism

Scrolling down our Instagram search, these days we face and read a lot about feminism and standing for women: a movement that means so much to us as females. Reviewing our memories and thinking about simple things - \_even trivialities\_ being a woman can be counted as our longest

experience no matter how old we are, and that is the most significant reason for us to be feminists and to stand for our and other women's rights. Although

there are so many issues to discuss in this movement we should not forget men and women who fought for us to be here and speak out about our rights or against patriarchal societies and the innumerable abuse/misuse happening all over the world. Therefore, in this article I am going to analyze Mark Twain's

"Adam's Diary" (1893) and "Eve's Diary" (1903) to illustrate how an American author paved the way for us with his pen.

For American authors, turn of the century was a new path to achieve their great expectations, and it really

against social beliefs. Twain chose a biblical setting for his books \_Adam's Diary and Eve's Diary\_ to attract the religious Northerners, and depicted his characters in a stereotypical way: The familiar man and woman to whom we have been introduced in many literary work: the physically strong and fairly smart man, and the talkative, sensitive, physically and sexually dependent woman.

A first reading of these books gives us nothing more than life in the Garden of Eden from Adam's and Eve's points of view, in which Eve enters Garden of Eden, disturbs Adam's comfort with her non-stop speeches, chooses names for animals that demonstrates her cleverness and wisdom, discovers fire with her curiosity, and finally eats the forbidden apple that causes their dislodgement \_this part is only narrated by Adam due to women's lack of voice in 20th century. Both diaries end with Adam and Eve's confession of their love towards each other, which again is an illustration of Eve's dependency on Adam.

As a result, in Christianity Eve is actually a woman who caused the misery of human beings, in opposition to Quran's verses in which both Adam and Eve ate the apple, thus Christians believe women to be sinners and have degraded them for a long time and the Northerners were not an exception.

Therefore, what Twain actually did was entering an on-screen battle with people's beliefs and thoughts which assumed women to be housewives and mothers with no social role, no voice, and no right to vote. He described his Eve an intelligent and curious inventor and explorer, also a subversive discoverer: a creature who had a progressive voice in her world, in contrast to Adam who many critics call naïve but in my opinion is a simple minded, physically strong creature.

Seventeen years after Twain's Eve's Diary, on August 18th 1920, laws changed and women's and feminists' battles worked out; however, it was the first step and they had a long way to go. As it is not fair to solely reward Twain for getting the vote, it is also not fair to forget his attempt to change his audiences' way of thinking. In short, he defied the patriarchal-minded society with his words and demonstrated an unseen or hidden brilliant aspect of women to it. His books, however, did not confront the sex-based vision of America and the world mostly because of close-mindedness of people at that time. Moreover, although the upcoming feminist waves had to do most of the combat, it has not finished yet, and obviously, it is our turn to fight for the equality of people's and women's rights.





### Feminism and Literature

In the last few years, we have been imposed to the idea of feminism more than ever and we have witnessed its impact on politics, economies, etc. but now we seek to know how feminism affected literature throughout history. The feminist movement in the United States and other countries was a social and political movement that sought equality for women and transformed the lives of thousands of women for the better.

With the advent of print in Europe in the mid-1400s, literature began to have a much bigger audience and it assisted the role of women writers who despite being denied the education that was offered to men, were able to express themselves in writing more than before. Much early in writing, women's works were devoted to nature. Many female writers wrote prayers and religious works originating in

Latin but with the increasing availability of print and women having their own voice, they started contributing to the body of literature by writing essays and letters. Letters, initially a private genre, became an elevated one with the works of such authors as Margaret Cavendish and Mary Wortley Montagu. These letters are now studied not only for their historical value but also the literary merits they hold. Modern analysis of women's literature from 1500 to 1800 investigates the pressures of social, political and economic conditions women were under as well as the literary values of their works.

At the beginning of the 19th century, women writers were largely confined in children's literature and poetry as the emotionalism of such genres was considered "feminine "but despite these assumptions women started writing fiction and they were soon criticized because of their 'lack of worldly experience, critical judgement and rationality'. Towards the end of the century, women expanded their subject matter and moved beyond highlighting the hardships of

Towomen and expressed their individualism and demanded more equal partnerships in marriage, law and politics with men.

The early decades of the 20th century was filled with turmoil and change in the world that impacted the feminist movement more. These changes were the two world wars, industrialization, urbanization and also the pressure and stress put upon domestic relationships, from the work place to the family. Amid these conflicts, the first half of the 20th century witnessed a flourishing time in literary arts as well as the further development of the new media such as radio and film. In this era a growing number of women with different racial and social backgrounds emerged and drew upon their varied experiences as Asians, Native Americans and Africans and addressed the issues of race and gender. In particular, African-American women became



prominent as part of the literacy and artistic movement known as the Harlem Renaissance which reached its peak during the 1920s and 1930s.

While women writers participated in literary and artistic movements during these years, they struggled greatly as creators. The world wars had a profound effect on the generation who had witnessed it especially women and it caused a lot of frustrated female artists to abandon their creative works and turn their energy to social and political causes and find new paths like journalism to express themselves and their ideas.

In several lectures that she gave during the 1930s, Virginia Woolf reflected upon the challenges she and her fellow writers faced during the first half of the century and noted that although women have been writing for years, the subjects they wrote of and the style they wrote in was still dictated by not only their own creative vision but also the standards imposed upon them. The feminist movement still continues to this day as well as the pressures put on the female writers' society and we see its effects on every aspect of our lives everyday but we wouldn't be where we are today if it weren't for the women who paved the path before us; Women writers such as Charlotte Bronte, Margaret Atwood, Kate Chopin, Jane Austen and so on who fought for our freedom and equality.
